By God's grace alone, mission work begun in Tappen, North Dakota in 1919 led to the organization of St. John's in 1924. By God's grace alone, for more than one hundred years, the good news of salvation in Jesus Christ has been proclaimed here. By God's grace alone, our Lord's gospel has not come to us not "with mere words, but with power." Through his powerful Word and Sacraments, the Holy Spirit has created and preserved saving faith in many hearts. God's people have been led to reach out to this community and beyond, with the saving truth of his Word.

For blessings beyond measure, we give thanks and praise to God! As our gracious Lord leads us forward from this time of celebration, may he also work in us, and in generations not yet born,

Beginnings: A Mission Congregation in Tappen

Large church memberships do not come into being overnight. This is especially true if the members of such a church are interested in establishing and continuing a church that is based solidly upon the principles of the unchanging Word of God. It takes people who are genuinely concerned about the Bible to incorporate into its membership only those who have a sincere respect for the phrase: "Thus saith the Lord."

In 1918, a Wisconsin Synod Lutheran church was unheard of in Tappen. The only Lutheran Church representing the Synodical Conference was 22 miles distant in the vicinity of Streeter, N.D. Research undertaken for this project has not disclosed the date the rural Streeter congregation was founded. However, it already appears on a 1911 plat map of Stutsman County, in a location at the northwestern corner of Streeter Township of Stutsman County, just across the Kidder County line — 22 miles southeast of Tappen and 7 miles northwest of Streeter (on today's maps, at the junction of 49th Street SE and 48th Avenue SE).

In a paper delivered to the WELS Minnesota District convention in 1970, Rev. E.R. Gamm discussed several early congregations and preaching stations of what would become the Dakota-Montana District, and their pastors, in the first two decades of the 1900s. He reported that "Pastor Hertler [served] at Temvic, Hazelton, Streeter, and Hampden, North Dakota, followed by Pastor A. Maas, and soon by Pastor S. Baer."

By God's grace, people began to settle in the Tappen community who were interested in the Bible as the supreme authority for matters of this life and that which is to come. For this reason, concerned Christians didn't think it was too much of a hardship to drive a Reo automobile over grass roads to such a church near Streeter. The trip took about an hour, but hearty Christians endured the wind and weather, the storms, sleet, and snow to hear God's message as it was told in the Bible.

Then things began to happen in Tappen. In the year 1919, the Joint Synod of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, and other states convened at Mankato, Minnesota. Pastor Philip Koehler of Iron Ridge, Wisconsin, attended this meeting. After the Synod meeting had adjourned, Pastor Koehler came to Tappen to visit his brothers — John and Erich Koehler. While visiting with them, Pastor Koehler discussed the potential for starting a mission in Tappen. The two brothers assured Pastor Koehler that they would gladly support the mission in Tappen if it were started. On his return trip home, Pastor Koehler contacted the Mission Board of the Minnesota District. This Mission Board promised to do what could be done as soon as possible.











These grave markers and this grove of trees bear witness to the location of First English Lutheran Church of Streeter, the "mother church" of St. John's. No original records of the congregation have been found to date, and the church building no longer stands on the premises. The local history book "Streeter, N.D. Diamond Jubilee" (1980), pages 280–281, reports that the former church building was renovated after it closed, and Archie and Magdalena (Kauk) Schweke were living there as of 1980. Information compiled in "Rural and Village Cemeteries of Stutsman County, North Dakota" indicates that Mrs. Archie Schweke was still living in the former church building in 1999. The same book relates that there were 16 burials in the cemetery, as reported by Mr. Archie Schweke; but only a few are marked. Marked burials include Ernestina Clara Schweke (1896–1920) and Oscar Albert Max Schweke (1893–1918) (upper left photo); Martha Schweke (1883–1939) (upper center photo); and John Schweke (1891–1954) (lower right photo).

On the other side of 48th Ave SE, on the Kidder County side of the line, in Graf Township, lies what is called the "Lutheran Church Split Burial," in "Cemeteries of Kidder County, North Dakota." The wooden cross (upper right photo) marks the grave of Mr. and Mrs. Banke (died 1918). The same reference book indicates that August Behnke (1893–1918) and Minnie Behnke (1897–1918) are buried there. Research did not disclose whether these were the same people as the Mr. and Mrs. Banke named on the wooden cross.


At this time also, other Lutherans had settled at Tappen. Two families from Watertown, South Dakota, who were members of St. Martin's congregation in Watertown, had purchased land here at Tappen. They were Fred and William Wallner. Mrs. A. Wallner, better known to us as Grandma Wallner, came along to keep house for her son William. Before leaving Watertown, Grandma Wallner consulted with her pastor, Pastor W. F. Sauer, President of the Dakota-Montana District, in regard to church services at Tappen. Pastor Sauer placed her request with Pastor A. W. Fuerstenau, chairman of the Dakota-Montana District Mission Board.

Pastor Fuerstenau came to Tappen in July of 1920 and, together with Pastor Samuel Baer, canvassed the Tappen vicinity and found several Lutheran families desirous of having Lutheran services in Tappen. After this canvass, Pastor Fuerstenau instructed Pastor Baer to conduct services in Tappen. Thus, Pastor Baer, who lived 7 miles northwest of Streeter and 22 miles from Tappen, added this new mission to his vast territory of mission endeavors. He was already conducting services in Hazelton and Hartford, North Dakota.

Pastor Baer served Tappen until the spring of 1921. At that time, the Mission Board decided to divide Pastor Baer's field because of the distance he had to travel. The division was Hazelton and Hartford as one mission field and Streeter and Tappen as another. Pastor Baer was transferred to Hazelton. The Streeter-Tappen mission was to have a new missionary.

In April of 1921, Pastor Carl Strassen was called to the Streeter-Tappen field. He served this field until May of 1923, when he accepted a call to McIntosh, South Dakota. As yet, the Tappen group had not officially organized into congregational status. The area was served as a preaching station.

Tappen went without a pastor from May until September, when Pastor Eugene Hinderer, a graduate of the Theological Seminary at Wauwatosa, Wisconsin, began his ministry in

this field. On September 2, 1923, Pastor F. Traub, of Bowdle, S.D., installed E. Hinderer in the Streeter congregation in the forenoon and in the afternoon at Tappen. At the installation service at Tappen, ten adults and six children were present.


Up to this time the pastor lived in the parsonage near the Streeter church. But Pastors S. Baer and C. Strassen recommended to the Mission Board that the new pastor should live in Tappen, since the greater part of the work of this mission field was at Tappen. This had been communicated to Pastor Hinderer in the

letter accompanying the call, and the decision as to the dwelling place was left to him. But as the recommendation came from the two former pastors, Rev. Hinderer decided to take their advice and so became the first Lutheran resident pastor at Tappen.

That Rev. Hinderer chose to live at Tappen, and not at Streeter, caused much bitter feelings in the congregation at Streeter, and one member was very much put out. This was Mr. D.E. Schwecke, a former pastor himself, who did not want to recognize Rev. Hinderer as his pastor, because he did not live in the parsonage at the Streeter congregation. Pastor Traub settled this matter with D.E. Schwecke before the installation services.

In January, 1924, the congregation at Tappen was organized; and the name adopted was Saint John's Evangelical Lutheran Church. Five members signed the first constitution. They were William Briese, Erich Koehler, Fred Wallner, Louis Wallner, and William Wallner. Louis Wallner was elected President of the congregation. Up to this time and until 1926, the services were conducted in the Congregational Church, as the newly organized congregation owned no buildings. But soon after the organization, it was felt that to carry out the Lord's work in a congregation and to carry out Synod's programs, it was best to have our own house of worship.

Many of the early records of St. John's have been lost. However, a "Journal" found by Pastor William Russow provides some insight into the early activity and growth of the congregation.

There are entries for offering collections (which likely correspond with worship services) in 1920 on December 13, 1920; in 1921, on July 11, October 17, and December 12; in 1922, on May 8, July 3, August 2, September 14, November 13, and November 27; in the first half of 1923, on January 16, April 30, and June 15. From the second half of 1923 going forward, services appear to have been held on an almost weekly basis.

Total offerings recorded from December 1920 to October 1, 1923 were \$47.18. Total expenses

recorded in the same period were \$36.78. The largest expense seems to have been church rent (\$5 on July 13, 1921; \$10 on October 8, 1922; \$6 on January 16, 1923).

One hymnal was purchased on October 2, 1923, for \$1.60. Additional hymnals were purchased on May 19, 1924 for \$16.00, and on July 18, 1924 for \$16.95. Early gifts given to support missions are recorded on August 3, 1924 (\$42.00), and \$4.77 on January 1, 1925 (\$4.77 to the Negro Mission). On July 5, 1925, \$67.12 was given to Synod for a Mission Festival.

Payments directly from the congregation to pastors during this early period: July 25, 2023, \$2.34 to Pastor Hinderer, for books; August 22, 1923, \$5.00 to Pastor Baer; August 27, 1923, \$8.44 to Pastor Hinderer, for books; January 2, 1925, \$15.00 to Pastor Hinderer; December 1925, \$20.00 to Pastor Schultz, of Hazelton.

A list of donations given to St. John's on January 17, 1924, is accompanied by names of some of the earliest members: F. Wallner, L. Wallner, W. Wallner, G. Grelthen, E.H. Koehler, I. Stauffer, W. Briese.


Cash on hand on January 1, 1926 is noted as \$33.82.

The First Church Building and Parsonage

In a meeting of the congregation in the spring of 1926, it was decided to build the church if the Mission Board would grant the congregation a loan of \$3,000.00. In this year the Synod of the Dakota-Montana District met at Elkton, S.D. It had also been decided by the congregation to join the Synod, and Jake Stroh, Sr. was elected delegate and signed the Constitution of the District for the congregation. At this District Synod meeting the Mission Board had a meeting, and Pastor Hinderer presented the wishes of the congregation in regard of a loan from the Church Extension Fund. A loan of \$3,320.00 was granted.

After returning from this Synod meeting, St. John's members started excavating for a basement for the new church on the lots the congregation had bought on Columbia Ave. Lightning storms and rain made construction a bit difficult. Fred Wallner recalled one


time during the construction, lightning struck so hard that his horses reared up and caused quite a scare. Nonetheless, the work on the new church progressed rapidly. On the 26th of July, 1926, the new church was dedicated to the Triune God. At this occasion,

Pastors S. Baer, J.P. Scherf and A.W. Blauert preached. In August of the same year, the congregation also built the parsonage. In the spring of 1927, the congregation built a garage.¹

The first church building served the needs of the congregation for many years — approximately thirty-three and one-third. The "founding fathers" must have planned for growth, when they constructed a building with seating capacity for 125.

Some 1926 disbursements suggest activity around the building of the first church: \$40.00 on lots, February 5, 1926; \$5.32 on taxes, March 10, 1926; \$60.00 on lots, April 3, 1926; \$5.00 to the Secretary of State for a charter, May 25, 1926; \$9.60 for an abstract, May 26, 1926. Activity increased rapidly in the second half of 1926 with many construction-related expenses appearing (including \$20.00 for an organ and \$45.00 for an altar). Gifts and offerings in 1926 rose to \$2,613.83, and the congregation had \$114.53 on hand on January 1, 1927.

By 1927, Pastor Hinderer was receiving \$25.00/month as salary from the congregation. Stipends to organist Ardella Woodwick also appear, ranging from \$2.50 to \$4.00 per month between 1927 and 1929. Pastor Hinderer's salary appears to have gradually been increased; for example, \$348.48 in 1930–31; \$258.24 in 1932; \$600.00 in 1934; \$556.91 in 1935 (with a note he was still owed \$43.09).

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¹ The version printed above is from the oldest historical document found, which states that the information was provided by Pastor Hinderer. A slightly different version was published in the history prepared for the 50th anniversary of St. John's: In February, 1924, the voters met after a worship service to ask the Mission Board for a loan of \$2,000 to build a church. In the interest of saving as much money as possible, the members themselves built the church under the guidance of a non-member architect. Lightning storms and rain made construction difficult. On July 26, 1926, the new church was dedicated to the Triune God. At this occasion, Pastors S. Baer, J. P. Scherf, and A. W. Blauert preached. Another \$2,000 loan was obtained for the purpose of building a parsonage which was built the same year. In the spring of 1927, the garage was built.

Receipts for 1928 amounted to \$1,311.55, and the congregation had \$485.37 on hand at the end of the year. From at least 1927 on, the congregation had an audit committee reviewing the books at the end of the year. An entry at the end of the 1928 disbursements reads, "Books for 1928 approved and found correct. Isaac Stauffer, Fred Geist, Louis H. Wallner."

Worshipers at Lutheran church services have always felt the need for an organ to

lead them in their singing. This is in keeping with our Lutheran heritage of Christian songs and singing. In the early years of the congregation such indeed was felt. In 1928 an organ was given to our congregation by a Lutheran Church in Zeeland, North Dakota. The conditions for this gift demanded that someone from Tappen pick it up. In those days such a trip wasn't quite as easy as it is today. Pastor E. Hinderer and Mr. Fred Wallner, together with a Model T, made the eventful trip.

The St. John's Ladies Aid was organized July 21, 1932, with Mrs. Eugene Hinderer as hostess. The object of the society was to foster Christian fellowship among its members, to perform works of charity, to provide for embellishment of the church and to raise money for home and foreign missions and the benefit of our own congregation. Some of the charter members were: Mrs. Eugene Hinderer, Mrs. E.H. Koehler, Mrs. J.L. Woodwick, Mrs. Perry Robinson, Mrs. John DeWitz, Mrs. L.H. Wallner, Mrs. Fred Wallner, Mrs. William Wallner, Mrs. Elmer Hopkins, Mrs. John Erickson, Mrs. George Fanta and Mrs. Oberlander.

Receipts and disbursements were somewhat lower in the Depression years of the 1930s than in the late 1920s, but the members continued to support the ministry of St. John's. Receipts in 1930–31 were \$728.32, and disbursements were \$715.89. Receipts and disbursements in 1932 were \$560.48 (a note appears that Pastor Hinderer was paid \$258.24 toward his salary, and \$161.76 was still owed). No entries appear in the ledger for 1933, but by 1934, expenses and income were balanced at \$828.48. Expenses and income in 1935 were balanced at \$870.84, with a note that \$14.00 was borrowed from a member to balance the account. Expenses and income in 1936 were balanced at \$875.80 (Pastor Hinderer's salary had been increased to \$720.00, but \$117.05 of that was still owed at the end of the year).

Entries for 1934 include names of members of the congregation who gave gifts and offerings during that year. Names on the list (as well as they can be made out) include Mrs. D. Blackmon; Godfrey Peterson; A. Gross; G. Harter; Fred Geist; C. Teske; Adam Koestler; Chas. Koestler; E. Koehler; Mrs. J.C. Kress; H.J. Kress; E. Kalmback; Conrad Lang; Gotthilf Lang; George Maw; Ira Maw; J.L. Woodwick; August Stroh; Fred Wallner; L.H. Wallner; Wm. Wallner; J. Wieland; George Kapp; Trammer; Wm. Briese; H. Stanke; L.T. Woodwick; J. Koehler; Fred Dockter; H. Heiden, Jr.; H. Heiden, Sr.; Mrs. Appelt – Ed Briese; G. Stadel. Lists containing many of these names, and additional names, appear also for 1935 and 1936.

Pastor Hinderer accepted a call to Bristol, Wisconsin, in December of 1938. He delivered his farewell sermon in Tappen Dec. 26, 1938. During the vacancy, St. John's was served by Pastor E.H. Krueger of Mandan, and First English Lutheran of Streeter was served by Pastor Hans Schultz of Hazelton.

A Church Building Paid Off, and Then Outgrown

Pastor William P. Holzhausen came to Tappen from Sioux City, Iowa, in April, 1939. Pastor Holzhausen was installed in St. John's as the resident pastor on Pentecost Sunday, May 28, 1939, by Pastor Krueger, who likewise had charge of the installation in Streeter in the evening. The wholesale removal of members out of the Streeter parish weakened that congregation to the extent that services were discontinued there in October, 1941.

It was during Pastor Holzhausen's tenure that several arrangements were tried to develop the Sunday School. The best success was achieved when the Sunday School was conducted in the church basement while the German service was in progress upstairs. The Ladies Aid took the lead in making the basement a more congenial assembly-room for the Sunday School. With some help from the congregation, they had the basement rewired, plastered, and painted. This was done during the last part of 1941 and early 1942.

On April 30, 1940, a tree-planting bee was held, setting alternate rows of green ash and Chinese elms on the lots east of the parsonage.

After sixteen years of debt, the congregation became debt-free at the close of 1942. The length of time to get out of debt is understandable, when one thinks back to the hard times of the 1930s. The Depression didn't hurt the farmers quite as much as the drought of 1934, 1935, and 1936. In 1936, the temperature reached 120 degrees and higher. William Wallner recalled coming home from a worship service and finding 50 chickens dead because of the extreme heat. Nevertheless, God protected his own and provided the necessary means to live and support the church. St. John's was attracting new members who were willing to sacrifice to keep their church alive.

ST. JOHN'S LUTHERAN CHURCH AT TAPPEN, NORTH DAKOTA

BOUT midway between Jamestown and Bismarck A and some one hundred miles north of the South Dakota border lies a struggling little village known as Tappen. The level, sandy expanse stretching out several miles in all directions from the town gives rise to the belief that we are living on the dried-up bottom of a vast lake. Settlers were attracted over fifty years ago by the glowing reports of the luscious grasslands available here. However, in the boom days of the great World War the plowshare was driven all too freely into the yielding soil, so that as a consequence much of the virgin sod was turned over to furnish an unwilling seedbed for wheat and ever more wheat. Then came the sad days of deficient moisture, withering winds, blistering heat, choking duststorms - shattered hopes. Bewildered agriculturists reluctantly abandoned homesteads; empty, weather-pocked dwellings were snaked into towns. Brown, barren acres,

unwisely exploited, greeted the eye on every hand. Reclamation rehabilitation, re-adjustment, though a slow, bitter process, have since inaugurated a new, more promising era

In all this turmoil and upheaval, this rise and fall of fortunes, a vigorous Lutheran congregation was making a valiant struggle for life. Its beginnings date back more than two decades when a Wisconsin pastor chose to visit two brothers. The possibility of opening a mission was earnestly and favorably discussed. About a year later a South Dakota mother accompanied her two sons to the unclaimed prairies. Before leaving her home congregation, she approached her pastor and president of his District in regard to their future spiritual well-being. Such agitation and concern had as its wholesome effect that by mid-summer of the year 1920 the mission-board chairman of the Dakota-Montana District together with a pas-

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tor of one of Synod's outposts arrived to conduct a preliminary survey of this locality. Sufficient prospects to warrant future growth influenced the explorers to establish a preaching station. The pulpit would be supplied from the afore-mentioned outpost some twenty-two miles away, which, however, for all practical purposes, was inaccessible to the Tappenites. This arrangement remained in force for about three years. Developments in the

parish by this time seemed to demand that a resident pastor be placed here. In consequence, a graduate of our Wauwatosa Theological Seminary arrived on the scene, and on September 1, 1923, was installed in the 1 o c a 1 Congregtaional c o m u n i ty church building in the midst of an attentive audience of ten adults and six chil-

dren. Pastor Eugene Hinderer energetically attacked the task set before him. In January, 1924, an organization was created that henceforth was to bear the name: "St. John's Lutheran Church at Tappen, Kidder County, North Dakota. Two years later a generous loan from Synod's Church Extension Fund was the cause of great rejoicing among the loyal people of St. John's. Before fall their fond dream of possessing their own church home and parsonage was realized. Work now commenced in earnest in gathering in straying, indifferent, shepherdless Lutherans, though the unchurched multitudes were by no means neglected. Contacts were established in various villages to the east and in a rural settlements to the north. The old rural Synod-outpost near Streeter dissolved in the course of time. In its place a new organization was born that now met in the town of Streeter and became a permanent part of the parish. Finally, after more than fifteen years of self-sacrificing, self-denying service in this

extensive field, Pastor Hinderer delivered his farewell sermon on December 26, 1938, preparatory to assuming a pastorate at Bristol, Wisconsin. Pastor E. H. Krueger of Mandan, No. Dak., supplied the vacancy at Tappen untill Pentecost Sunday, May 28, 1939, when St. John's again received a resident pastor in the person of Wm. P. Holzhausen.

While the growth of God's kingdom at Tappen has not

been phenomenal, there has, however, been a consistent, healthy increase, and there were especially notable accretions through adult confirmation. The records of the congregation reveal the following statistics: two well-attended services are conducted every Sunday morning, one in English and one in German; there is a voting

membership of 48; 100 communicants; 315 souls; 93 are registered in the Sunday school; 5222.15 were raised during the past ten months for Synodical purposes. The congregation has a mixed choir as well as a Junior choir and an active Ladies' Aid. By the grace of God we hope in the not-too-distant future to become self-sustaining. The property of St. John's, conveniently located on twelve lots, presents an inviting appearance, easily outstanding among the church homes of the village, the congregational community, the German Evangelical, and the only Roman Catholic church in Kidder County. In retrospect, we cannot help but marvel at our gracious Lord's infinite goodness in developing His Zion in this outlying district, and are reminded once more of His word recorded in the 100th Psalm: "Know ye that the Lord He is God: it is He that hath made us, and not we ourselves; we are His people, and the sheep of His pasture."

Pastor Holzhausen contributed this article, published in the official Wisconsin Synod magazine, The Northwestern Lutheran, Vol. 27, No. 10 (May 19, 1940).

No entries appear in the old financial "Journal" between early 1937 and 1940. Records for 1941 and 1942 show that special offerings were given in those years, to retire the congregation's debt. Detailed lists of names of people who gave specific offerings appear for 1941, 1942, and 1943 — which is as late as the entries in this journal go. The names are associated with envelope numbers, and the lists indicate that as many as 126 different households and individuals had offering envelopes in those years.

In August 1941, a bequest of \$500.00 made by the late Henry Kress of St. John's became available to the congregation, and this was applied to the Church Extension Fund debt against the church property. This gift served to stimulate the congregation to the extent that a debt-reduction campaign was inaugurated, which realized the sum of \$300.00 for debts, besides enough to put two coats of paint on the buildings the following spring. The buildings were painted in 1942. A compromise-settlement offer by the Board of Trustees of Joint Synod was brought to the attention of the congregation by the District Mission Board Chairman, Pastor P.G. Albrecht. In the late fall congregation raised a sum of \$1,080.00, which sum was accepted as payment in full on the debt. So the congregation was entirely free of debt at the close of 1942.

In January, 1943, Pastor Holzhausen accepted a call to serve as pastor of Trinity, West Mequon, Wisconsin. During the vacancy, Pastor O.W. Heier of Jamestown served the congregation.

On February 24, 1943, Pastor E.L. Mehlberg of Faith, South Dakota, accepted the call to serve St. John's in Tappen. He was installed at St. John's on Invocavit Sunday, March 14, 1943, by Pastor O.W. Heier. During his pastorate, the pastor's salary was increased 10%, the parsonage was re-shingled, a janitor was hired, and the 40 members adopted a \$2,500 budget.

At the close of the year 1943 the members of St. John's decided that the congregation should be able to support itself in the future. On January 1, 1944 St. John's officially became self-supporting.

The congregation also took steps to beautify its house of worship. In the month of May, 1944 the interior of the church was painted. The parsonage was re-shingled on the south side in the spring of 1943, and in the following spring of 1944 a hot water system was installed by the congregation.

The arrangement for the time of Sunday services and Sunday School was continued as before. Bilingual services were held whenever regular services were conducted.

At the suggestion of the Mission Board, the Crystal Springs territory was canvassed to ascertain the advisability of beginning a mission there. The canvass, which was conducted by Pastors O.W. Heier and J.J. Wendland, revealed that a mission at Crystal

Springs was highly warranted. Pastor Mehlberg accordingly began to hold regular Sunday afternoon services in the north room of the Village public school house which the School Board of that district kindly offered for use without charge. Regular afternoon services were begun in Crystal Springs on November 7, 1943, with adult instruction and Sunday School immediately after the service.

During the summer months of 1944, some members of the Crystal Springs mission painted their place of worship, giving it a more cheerful and wholesome atmosphere. Additions were also made to give the room a more churchly appearance. On August 9, 1944, Mrs. Ole Halvorsen, a member of the Crystal Springs mission, donated about 150 acres of land in South Dakota to our Wisconsin Synod, the proceeds of which were to be used for missions.

On August 13, 1944, Pastor Mehlberg accepted a call to serve Immanuel congregation at Pelican Lake, Minnesota. Pastor E. H. Krueger of Mandan served during the vacancy.

On October 22, 1944, Pastor Ruben Kettenacker was installed at St. John's, with Pastor Krueger officiating and Pastor G. Ehlert of Hazelton assisting. During his four-year tenure, the budget of the congregation was raised to \$4,000. A committee was established to look into the possibility of adding bathroom facilities to the parsonage. In January 1945 the congregation installed a new furnace and water softener in the parsonage. New light fixtures were also installed in the parsonage.

In January, 1945, the Crystal Springs mission was dropped. The members requested to attend services at Tappen.

On February 29, 1948, Pastor Kettenacker accepted a call to Charles City, Iowa. A five-month vacancy came with his leaving.

After several calls from the field, the congregation submitted its request to the Assignment Committee of the Synod for the purpose of obtaining a pastor. The call was answered when Pastor Loren Schaller was assigned to Tappen in 1948. A mimeograph was purchased and bulletins were printed every Sunday.

During his pastorate, a \$2,900, 12' x 60' addition was added to the parsonage, and bathroom fixtures were installed. A Minshall-Estey organ was purchased new for \$1,010. This organ served the needs of the congregation in both the old and the new church buildings for 18 years. The budget was increased to \$7,500.

On May 20, 1951, Pastor Schaller accepted a call to Osceola, Wisconsin.

On June 12, 1951, Pastor Edward J.
Otterstatter of Flasher, North Dakota was called. At a quarterly meeting on
September 30 of the same year, a motion was passed to appoint a committee to start a Building Fund for a new church.
The men elected were Norbert Borth,
Roy Haadem, Donald Hasse, Ben
Heiden, John Hoffer, and Harold Wallner.
The amount of the first collection was
\$623.25. A beginning was made.

The following comments appear in the program prepared for the mortgage burning service, in 1968:

New years bring new needs. The old church was not to remain for long.

Many members can recall the crowded

conditions which existed in the old building. The Sunday Services were crowded to say nothing of the festivals. If a person wanted to get a seat on Christmas Eve, he had to come quite early before the actual Service began. If a person wanted to guarantee that he had a seat for a Funeral Service, again he had to arrive quite a bit ahead of schedule before the time for Worship. The old building didn't seem quite adequate to accommodate the needs of the growing congregation. More space was obviously in demand.

Space for the Service wasn't the only reason a new building was needed. The Sunday School was in dire need for more room to conduct the growing Sunday School of nearly 100 children. Although the church basement, the parsonage basement, and the church native were used for facilities, additional space was essential. Something had to be done.

There was still another reason why a NEW church building was needed. The old structure was worn out from use and remodeling would have been like adding several inches of leather to a worn-out shoe. It seemed financially unsound to remodel. Nothing could have been done with a humid basement. Many can remember when water stood as high as the tables. Such humid conditions were not conducive for Worship. A change in buildings was almost essential.

The Fund continued to grow. By January 1954 the total amounted to \$3079.66. In 1955, the question of beginning the building was brought before the congregation, but it was

defeated, 12–9. Time passed — collections continued and by January 1957, this Fund amounted to \$11,606.62.

During the six and a half-year pastorate of Rev. Otterstatter, stokers were installed in both church and parsonage. Like David of the Bible, Pastor Otterstatter had the privilege of beginning the new church, but someone else was to do the actual building. The Building Fund total increased to \$15,213.45. On December 22, 1957, Pastor Otterstatter accepted a call to Monticello, Minnesota. Pastor Helmuth Rutz of Jamestown was the vacancy pastor for the six-month vacancy, during which five calls were issued before the prayers of the congregation were answered.

Pastor Frederick Mutterer became our next pastor in June, 1958. During the three and a half years of Pastor Mutterer's tenure, a Stewardship Committee was organized, a Cradle Roll program was initiated, and other organizational activity was undertaken.

On July 20, 1958, the first son of the congregation was ordained and commissioned as a missionary to Nigeria. This was Alvin Werre, son of Mr. & Mrs. Christ Werre.

A New Church Building for St. John's

The most noticeable change during Pastor Mutterer's time here was the building of the new church. The need was definitely there.

On November 2, 1958, the congregation voted to begin plans for building a new church building. The plans were broken down into four committees. They were the Construction Plans, Finances, Interior, & Location. Since this was to be a project for ALL the members of the congregation, it was felt that ALL the voters should have some part on one of the committees.

In January of the following year, the plans for the new church were presented to the voters. The following is a quote from the January 25th, 1959 Sunday Bulletin: "The Plans for our new church were presented to the voters of our congregation last Thursday evening. The very first sketches of our architect were presented. Our architect (Mr. David Schoenrock of Hazen, North Dakota) plans to use all the volunteer help our congregation can supply. Cost estimates depend on what <u>you</u> are willing to do with your hands. The more we do, the bigger and better quality church we will have for the least amount of money."


On February 2, 1959, a contract was signed with Schoenrock Sons, Inc. of Hazen, North Dakota. The following is another quote from the Sunday Bulletin of February 15, 1959: "In our meeting last Sunday the contract was signed for the building of our new church.

The cost was about \$60,000. It is our sincere hope that we have over half this much money on hand by the time we break ground this spring." From another quote it is learned that one canvass made during the months of February & March netted \$6,081.06 in cash.

Ground-breaking services were held on Easter Sunday, April 5, 1959, with Pastor S. Baer, the initial pastor in Tappen, then of Morton, Minnesota, preaching and turning the first shovelful of earth. The first major building step actually begun. Already the brick had arrived and was paid for and the first load of lumber had been brought.

Cornerstone-laying services were held on May 17, 1959. Former pastor Professor Loren Schaller was the guest speaker. Together with the Festival Collection, the Building Fund amounted to \$26,348.73.

Soon the brick began to be put in place, cement was poured for the arches, scaffolds were built and by the 7th of July the arches and beams were ready to be put in place. This was followed by insulation, shingling, filling the window frames, & finishing the roof. In



spite of the much-needed rain during the first part of September, the building began to resemble a church.

As the building of the church progressed, the members (men, women, and children) willingly gave of their time and talents. Nearly 10,000 hours of labor was donated; about 175 or seven out of every eight communicants were actively engaged in the building project. And that donating of time went right up to the day of dedication — at 2:00 A.M. on Dedication Day, November 29, 1959, people were still busy completing the essential items. All work came to an end when services began.

The worshipers gathered in the old church for the last time. After a hymn was sung, a procession moved to the new building. The keys were handed to the pastor, the lock was turned, a prayer was offered, the president of the congregation opened the door for the first time, and this new building was being used for a House of God. Pastor Ruben Kettenacker preached for the morning German and English Service. Pastor Donald Kolander was the afternoon speaker. The evening service message was delivered by Pastor Martin Janke of Roscoe, South Dakota. To make it more of a festal day, an organ borrowed from a music store in Fargo was used for the three services. Miss Shirley Martin, Miss Rogene Doerr, and Mrs. F. Mutterer played the organ for these special services.

Architect's Description of the New Church

The dignity and beauty of our structure serves to direct the mind and the soul to the spiritual and the heavenly.

The architecture is of contemporary adaptation. The functional lines and plan make this new house of worship extremely fitting for all categories of church worship and functions. Since the structure is built entirely above ground, basement steps are entirely eliminated.

The overall dimensions are 101 feet by 86 feet, and cover 7500 square feet of area. The church proper and or nave will seat 280 people. There are facilities for an additional 60 people in the overflow side aisles, and to the rear of the present pews. Choir facilities will seat an additional 25.

The exterior is faced with Hebron brick. The interior is made up of different arrangements of light weight masonry. A thickness of styrofoam insulation is between these two masonry walls.

The entire roof structure is made up of laminated beams and trusses. These are covered with three inch decking, over which is applied a one and one-half inch fiberglass insulation, and 300 pound combination shingles. The flat deck over the narthex, kitchen, assembly, and other rooms is five ply built up roof.

The dominating tower is on the east side of the nave. It rises to a height of thirty-three feet above the ground. An aluminum cross reaches another fifteen feet above the tower.

The back wall of the chancel is also layed up of Hebron brick to typify the solidity of our Lutheran heritage. A large cedar cross is suspended from this wall above the altar. The altar is made up of Wisconsin limestone, with carved oak inset.

The chancel is covered with nylon carpet. Cork tile and corktone asphalt tile cover the nave floor.

The warm radiant color scheme of the windows and interior finish blend to give this an inviting, worshipful atmosphere.

The remainder of the building consists of a spacious assembly which is forty-four by thirty-four feet. The large narthex combines to serve as a vestibule for the assembly area. The kitchen is arranged with complete facilities. There is a larger meeting room or class room, a boiler room, lavatories, and a sacristy study.

The building is heated with two small boilers and baseboard radiant type heating units.

This imposing structure stands as a living monument to the faith and vision, the courage and co-operation, the patience and sacrifice of the members of St. John's Evangelical Lutheran congregation.

DONATED LABOR:

Without the countless willing hands of nearly every congregation member this building would be impossible.

Our first brick arrived on Ash Wednesday, February 11. From that time on members, and many other interested people in the community, took part whenever and wherever possible. Space does not permit us to mention all by name. To you we say today: "Thank You" and "God bless you all for your help."

Special thanks are due to the "truckers" who were willing to go at a moment's notice. They saved us much freight. Tractors were available whenever we needed them.

Sanders and finishers, painters and lacquerers kept pace with the carpenters. In all we would estimate about ten thousand hours of help were donated.

A special "thank you" is warmly extended to the ladies who have faithfully served lunch to the workers since July. Morning, afternoon, and evening crews were refreshed and enjoyed the visiting during lunch-time.

Surely we were all brought much closer together through this effort for the Lord. May He continue to draw us closer together in the unity of the faith.

The following appeared in the program prepared for the mortgage burning service in 1968:

This quote was taken from the NORTHWESTERN LUTHERAN issue of January 31, 1960 — "Were not for His guidance of our congregation so that 7 out of 8 members were able to help, donating nearly 10,000 hours of labor; were it not for

His blessing upon the architect-contractor and laborers; certainly our building would not yet be dedicated to His Service. Only our Lord could work in our hearts the willingness to serve Him in this glorious undertaking." The Lord was responsible for moving the hearts of His people to see the initial need for a church. It was going to be the LORD who was going to see the remaining debt through to completion.

In order to pay for the building, a loan was negotiated through the A.A.L. for the sum of \$30,000. This loan was supposed to be paid for by February 21, 1970. Some said — "it will never be done." Others thought that the loan could be taken care of in several years. Although by the First Anniversary of Dedication the Building was 2/3 paid for, much was left to be done.

Pastor Mutterer accepted a call to serve as pastor of Fox Lake, Wisconsin in 1961. During the next 19 months, the congregation was without a full-time pastor. Two vacancy Pastors — Roland Zimmerman, of Bismarck, N.D., and Marvin Putz of Valley City, N.D. — did admirable work in serving the congregation from 60 and 85 miles distant. Many calls were issued and returned during these 19 months.

In April, 1963, Pastor Ernst Klaszus of Dowagiac, Michigan, became pastor of the congregation. He served Tappen until May 1965, when he accepted a call to serve a mission in Canada. A 14-month vacancy existed after he left. Pastor George Rothe of Bismarck was the vacancy pastor.

On July 24, 1966, Pastor Walter Oelhafen, Jr., a graduate of Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, Mequon, Wisconsin, was installed as pastor here. Perhaps the most memorable day during his pastorate was the Mortgage Burning Service held on November 17, 1968, nine years after the church was built. The following comments appeared in the program for that service:

Although many had hoped that the church building would be paid off in 2 years, this was not to be the case. ... In 1961 & 1962 over \$13,000 was received for the debt. From 1963–1965 a total of approximately \$7,500 was received for a 3 year period. From 1966–1968 about a 2 and ½ year period — about \$12,300 was collected. As most of you will recall, 1967 was a very bad year as far as crops went. Lack of money doesn't seem to hinder the Lord's Kingdom, but a lack of love certainly can do its worst to the Lord's Business.

For the original \$30,000 loan a total of \$6,165.10 was paid in interest rates. If the congregation would have waited until it had ALL of the funds, the cost of the building increase would have FAR outweighed the interest rates that were paid.

As we look back over the years, we at St. John's have <u>MUCH</u> for which to be thankful. The Lord brought us through many a dark and dreary day in more times than we would perhaps admit.

The comment the Architect made in the Dedication Booklet is worth repeating: "This imposing structure stands as a living monument to the faith and vision, the courage and cooperation, the patience and sacrifice of the members of St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church."

THE LORD SAYS

WE THANK GOD ... AND REMEMBER ...

Pastor Mutterer preached for this occasion. His sermon text was Psalm 50:14–15, and the sermon theme was "Time Marches On." The Parsonage Fund was started when Pastor Mutterer returned the expense check that was given to him, and he requested that it be used to open this fund.

Later that same day, November 17, 1968, a Dedicatory Organ Recital was held at 2:30 p.m., followed by the Organ Dedication Service at 3 p.m. Mrs. Anita Schultz was the dedicatory organist; pre-service musical selections included *Prelude and Fugue in F, Ein Feste Burg, Nun Komm, Der Heiden Heiland, Vom Himmel Hoch, Herzliebster Jesu, Christ Lag in Todesbanden, Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring*, and *Voluntary on the Doxology*. Pastor Marvin Putz of Mandan was the guest preacher. The following notes appear in the program for that day:

As far back as 1959, the purchase of a different organ was discussed, and a committee to look into this was appointed.

Organ interest was renewed when a gift for \$1,000 was received for 'something the church needed badly in the building'. Other Funeral Memorials followed & offerings were designated for the Organ Fund. As of this writing over \$1,700 has been offered in Bequests or Memorials.

The voters took action to begin looking into the different organs available. Four different organs were used for 4 different Services. The first was an ALLEN, then came a RODGERS, the next was a BALDWIN, and the last was a WURLITZER. At a Special Meeting on August 25th a nearly unanimous vote favored the

RODGERS. The list price of this organ amounted to \$6,000, but eventually the transaction was completed for \$4,000.

DESCRIPTION OF THE NEW ORGAN

The RODGERS organ is a 3 manual – "Trilogy" model, with full foot pedal accompaniment, two sets of speakers installed in the front and rear of the church, a Heart and Carillon unit installed, 28 'stops,' 4 Couplers, & one Mixture. This organ should serve well the needs of the congregation for many years to come.

In June, 1969, Pastor Oelhafen accepted a call to serve at Flint, Michigan. There was a one-month vacancy, with Pastor Rothe serving the congregation.

Years of Service and Thanksgiving: The Late Twentieth Century

Pastor Russell Kloehn, assigned to Tappen from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, was ordained and installed into the ministry at St. John's on June 29, 1969. For the first two years, the pastor and his family lived in the old parsonage. During his pastorate, plans were selected for the new parsonage; the contract was signed on June 16, 1971, with C. H. Carpenter Lumber Co. in Jamestown. It was decided that the men of the congregation would tear down the old parsonage and that an auction be held.




The new parsonage when completed, 1971

While the new parsonage was being built, the pastor and his family lived in the back classroom of the church. The members also gave of their time and talents to complete the building of the house. On Sunday, November 28, 1971, the new parsonage was dedicated, with Pastor Mutterer as guest speaker.



St. John's featured on the cover of

"Continue (ye) in the grace of God." (Acts 13:43)

St. John's Ev. Lutheran Church has set aside July 14, 1974, as a day of rejoicing and thanksgiving to Almighty God for His unmerited grace bestowed upon this congregation the past fifty years.

That little word GRACE is like a small window that opens out to a great

landscape; for it gathers up into one expression the whole infinite variety of benefices and bestowments which the Lord showers down upon us. It is the undeserved love and favor of God toward man. It is this grace of God which gave us our Savior; which removed our sins; which took away death and gave us life; which




May God's grace continue to rest upon us as we strive together for the Gospel of Christ so that His kingdom may come and His will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

Pastor Kloehn served at St. John's through November 1974, when he accepted a call from a congregation in Ontario, Wisconsin. Upon his departure, Pastor Henry Ellwein accepted a call to St. John's from Estelline, South Dakota. He served here until his retirement in June 1977; during retirement, he lived in Rapid City, S.D.

Mindful of the bad effects of long vacancies, the voters' assembly went directly to the Seminary when Pastor Ellwein announced his retirement. There was no vacancy. Pastor Roger Kovaciny was ordained at St. John's in July of 1977.

In 1978, a second son of the congregation, Elton Stroh, was ordained as a home missionary in Kansas City, Missouri. He continues to serve at this time, now in the Crossroads Consulting Ministry, based in Sun Prairie, Wisconsin.

In 1978, a community history book was prepared in honor of Tappen's centennial year. The submission to that book for St. John's is reprinted at the end of this history, providing a snapshot of the congregation's leadership and activities during that time.

The 55th anniversary of the congregation was observed on July 8, 1979. On that day, the mortgage from the parsonage construction was burned, and the congregation also gave thanks for being completely free of debt. An anniversary service was held at 10 a.m., mortgage burning at 11 a.m., dinner at 11:45, and a German service at 2:00 p.m.

In the service bulletin for August 19, 1979, Pastor Kovaciny reported that average attendance at St. John's in 1977 was 161; in 1978, 150; in 1979, 140. This decline was a continuation of a trend already seen while the two previous pastors were serving here. Offerings, on the other hand, had increased. New carpeting was installed in the church and entry in December, 1980. The church pews were refinished in late 1983 and early 1984.

On December 13, 1983, Pastor Kovaciny informed the congregation that he had accepted a call to Lamb of God, Columbus, Ohio. A farewell dinner for Pastor Kovaciny and his family was held on January 1, 1984. Pastor Kovaciny later went on to serve our sister church body in Ukraine. For a number of years, St. John's helped to support the work of ministry in Ukraine

Mr. Wallner was born Aug. 12, 1891, at Gibbon, Minn., the son of Louis and Augusta (Draves) Wallner. He received his education at Gibbon and moved to Watertown S.D. in 1912. He married Sylvia Bell Dec. 20, 1916, at Watertown. They came to North Dakota in 1920 and settled in Westford Township near Tappen. She died Dec. 8, 1976.

He moved to Tappen in December, 1984, and in 1985 he moved to Rapid City where he has lived for the past three years with his daughter and son-in-law.


He was a member of St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Tappen.

Steiner, a 1981 graduate of Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary who was then serving in Daytona Beach, Florida, accepted the divine call issued through the congregation. He was installed on March 11, 1984, with Pastor John Ruege, Sr., of Bismarck, serving as liturgist for the service. The sixtieth anniversary of St. John's was observed in a special service on July 8, 1984.


On the evening of October 26, 1984, the student choir from Nebraska Ev. Lutheran High School presented a sacred concert at St. John's.

Also in October 1984, the congregation applied for membership in the association of the proposed Dakota-Montana District area Lutheran high school. In 1988, Terry Kemmet served as president of the Dakota-Montana Lutheran High School Association. He

continued to be deeply involved in the establishment of what is now Great Plains Lutheran High School (GPLHS), our district's area Lutheran high school in Watertown, South Dakota. St. John's continues to be a member of the GPLHS association to this day.

In 1988, John and Fay Hoffer bequeathed a substantial amount of money to St. John's; and during Pastor Steiner's tenure, extensive remodeling inside and out was done, with much of the labor being donated. The following information appears in the service bulletin for June 21, 1992:



As always, our thanks is to God who moves in people's hearts to express their love for Jesus in ways that benefit those around them.

In 1990, Jonathan Werre, a grandson of the congregation, graduated from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary and was ordained into the pastoral ministry. Following service near the Twin Cities and in Red Deer, Alberta, he now serves as pastor at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, in Sioux Falls, S.D. He preached at St. John's for a Mission Festival on June 6, 2021.

On June 21, 1992, a new Allen organ was dedicated, with Professor William Birsching, friend of the congregation, acting as the organist and recitalist. Prof. Birsching was instructor of music for some years at Northwestern Lutheran Academy in Mobridge, and

at that time was director of music at Northwestern College in Watertown. Wisconsin. The new organ, which continues to serve St. John's to the present time, is an Allen MDS 35, purchased through Schmitt Music, Fargo, N.D., in 1991. It features the latest in the digital reproduction technology of its time, and hence, the authenticity of its sound.














By God's Grace, a Continuing Mission in Tappen

In 2003, another Tappen community history book was prepared, to celebrate Tappen's 125th anniversary. The submission to that book for St. John's is reprinted at the end of this history, providing a snapshot of the congregation and its activities, at that time in our history.

Other projects were undertaken in more recent years, although the precise dates are not now recalled. Harold Robinson donated new upper cupboards for the north side of the kitchen, built by the Tappen shop class. Later, the lower cupboards were also re-done, at the time the second stove was added. Justin Olson made a new wooden top for the old altar, with a cross inlaid in the wood. The old altar is now located on the west side of the fellowship hall.





Pastor Russow served at St. John's until 2007, when he accepted a retirement call to serve a congregation in Hot Springs, South Dakota. His fiftieth anniversary in the pastoral ministry was celebrated in 2017. He has returned to St. John's from time to as a guest preacher and for funerals and special occasions. He served as our vacancy pastor in June 2023.

Pastor David Hein of Mandan served St. John's during the vacancy. Pastor David Schmidt was called to serve at St. John's by assignment from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary. He was installed on July 15, 2007.

In the summer of 2008, air conditioning was installed in the church. This was made possible through memorial offerings given in memory of Walter and Frieda Martin.


On October 30, 2011, 4 p.m., St. John's hosted the Joint Reformation Service for the churches of the Rough Rider Circuit of the Western Conference of the Dakota-Montana District, Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod. Pastor Jordan Ertl from Our Saviour's in Bismarck preached on Isaiah 43:1–7, and Pastor Schmidt served as presiding minister.

On Saturday, March 17, 2012, St. John's hosted a concert of

Christian hymnody presented by the WELS musical group *Koiné*. On July 24, 2013, St. John's hosted a concert of Christian music by the WELS musical group, *Branches Band*.

In 2014, after roughly three years of gathering special offerings and memorials, the peaked roof of the church was re-covered with steel shingles, at a cost of approximately \$50,000. Also during Pastor Schmidt's time here, Larry & Debbie Olson built and installed the new metal stalls in the women's restroom.

On June 29, 2014, Pastor Schmidt announced that he had accepted a call to Grace Lutheran Church, Burke,

Pastor Jordan Ertl, from Our Saviour's Lutheran Church in Bismarck, served as the vacancy pastor.

Pastor Gerhardt Juergens accepted the call to serve at St. John's. His installation service was held October 19, 2014.

In 2015, the parsonage had air conditioning installed, new boilers were installed in the church, and another stall was added to the parsonage garage. In 2016, a new baptismal font was built for the church. Church sidewalks, the driveway at the parsonage, and basement egress windows at the parsonage were also completed in 2016. In 2017, new flooring was installed in every part of the church except the sanctuary.

Pastor Juergens conducted monthly devotional services for the residents of Golden Manor care facility in Steele; and this work continues to the present time. Between 2015 and 2020, St. John's provided "WILD" (Word in Love and Deed) on Wednesday afternoons, an after-school program for students at the Tappen Public School. In 2019, revisions to the Constitution and By-Laws of the congregation were adopted. New kitchen cabinets and hardwood flooring were also installed in the parsonage in 2019.

On August 30, 2019, St. John's again hosted a concert of Christian music by the WELS musical group *Branches Band*. On October 1, 2019, St. John's hosted the fall pastor's conference for the Western Conference of the Dakota-Montana District of WELS.

Pastor Juergens served vacancies at Christ the King

Lutheran Church in Jamestown and St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Valley City, during portions of his time as pastor of St. John's. Christ the King closed on September 22, 2019. Some members of Christ the King transferred their membership to St. John's, after the Jamestown congregation closed.

In 2022, an updated sound system was installed in the church, and a patio was built on the north side of the parsonage, behind the garage. In 2023, new windows were installed on the west side of the church. At the parsonage, new carpeting was installed in several rooms, much of the interior was painted, and the inside of the garage was finished. Other projects of recent years included the construction of a new altar and baptismal font for the sanctuary, built by Pastor Juergens' brother-in-law.

In October 2022, Pastor Juergens received and accepted a call to serve as Pastor at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Lakeside, Arizona. During the vacancy of a few weeks which followed, Pastor William Russow served as vacancy Pastor.

By God's grace, St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church of Tappen, North Dakota, continues active ministry to the present day. Sunday worship services are held at 10 a.m., with Sunday School and adult Bible study during the hour following worship from Labor Day through Memorial Day. St. John's is currently blessed to have two organists, Mrs. Beth Leier and Mrs. Corinne Muller.

St. John's holds the only Christmas Eve children's service in the local area, with approximately 200 people attending the evening services on December 24 in 2022 and 2023. Wednesday evening services are held during the Lenten season; and for the past several years, on the Wednesday of Holy Week, St. John's has conducted a Christian Passover Seder meal at 7 p.m., with WELS members from nearby congregations and other guests also attending. On Easter Sunday morning, we have a "Son-Rise" service, a breakfast, and a festival service.

Youth confirmation classes are held from September through May, with four young people having been confirmed in 2023 and four in 2024.

Bible Information Classes are also offered for adults interested in membership, or simply interested in learning more about the Christian faith.

Summer "Family Bible School" has been offered over three evenings, in 2022, 2023, and 2024, with between 15 and 25 children and between 10 and 15 adults participating each evening. The congregation also has a float every year in the Tappen Fall Harvest Fest Parade, on Saturday of Labor Day weekend, handing out water bottles and inviting the public to our Sunday worship services.

Since at least 1998, St. John's has aired the previous Sunday's sermon from 7 to 7:15 a.m. on KSJB 600 AM, Jamestown, N.D. Since 2009, St. John's Sunday morning worship service is recorded and televised on the local BEK TV communications network at 6 p.m. every Sunday evening, on channel 72. Services are also streamed live on YouTube, with videos of past services available for viewing. St. John's maintains a Facebook page and a web site, www.stjohnstappen.org.

St. John's is a congregation of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod, in the Rough Rider Circuit of the Western Conference of the Dakota-Montana District. The congregation is self-sufficient, with offerings covering all the expenses, and with ten percent of the budget going to support Congregational Mission Offerings. The congregation has no debt, and holds a \$100,000 CD at WELS Church Extension Fund. God's people support the gospel ministry at St. John's.

Throughout its history St. John's has served the Tappen area with faithful proclamation of God's Word of grace. Its pastors and lay leaders have always confessed the fact that the Bible is the inspired Word of God. St. John's also subscribes to the Lutheran Confessions and the confessional creeds of the Christian Church. God continues to pour out his grace since 1924, through the ministry of the Word and sacraments of St. John's Lutheran Church, Tappen, ND.







Steele and Lake Williams as the missions. Tuttle was made a mission to McClusky, N. D.

Improvements were made in the rectory during 1960. The old wooden floor of the basement of the church was ripped out in the fall of 1963 and a cement floor was poured. At the same time a new kitchen was built with running water. Again this work was done entirely by the people of the parish.

This is the latest improvement that has been made in the Tappen parish to the present date.

ST. JOHN'S LUTHERAN CHURCH

In the year 1919 the Joint Synod of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan and other states convened at Mankato, Minnesota. Rev. Phillip Keehler of Ironridge, Wisconsin attended this meeting in regards to a Lutheran church being started at

Tappen, North Dakota. After this meeting Rev. Koehler visited his brothers, Erich and John Koehler in Tappen and received their support in starting a mission congregation in Tappen.

In the spring of 1920, Fred and William Wallner settled in Tappen vicinity adding two

more Lutheran families. In July of the same year the Tappen vicinity was canvassed by pastors A. W. Fuerstenau and S. Baer; the latter being the Lutheran pastor at Streeter, North Dakota. After this canvassing, Tappen was added to his territory, which already included Hazelton and Hartford congregations. He served these congregations until the spring of 1921. The territory was divided and Tappen and Streeter were served by Pastor C. Strassen from the spring of '21 until May of 23' when Pastor Eugene Hinderer began his ministry. Paster Hinderer was installed September 2, 1923 in a forenoon service at Streeter and an afternoon service at Tappen.

The mission Board recommended that Pastor Hinderer live at Tappen instead of the rural parsonage near Streeter. This caused some hard feeling with some of the Streeter Congregation.

The congregation at Tappen was organized and adopted the name of St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church in January 1924. The following signed the constitution: E. H. Koehler, L. H. Wallner, William Wallner, Fred Wallner and William Briese. L. H. Wallner served as the first President of the newly organized congregation, E. H. Koehler as treasurer and William Wallner as secretary.

Services were held in the Congregational Church until the spring of 1926, when it was decided to build a church of their own. The new church was dedicated July 26, 1926. The parsonage was built in August of the same year and the following year the garage was built. Pastor Hinderer served these congregations until 1938 when he left for Bristol, Wisconsin. Since then St. John's has been served by the following Pastors: Wm. P. Holzhausen, E. L. Melberg, R. A. Kettenacher, Loren Schaller, E. J. Otterstater, F. Mutterer and Ernest Klauszus. At the time of this writing in the fall of '65, St. John's is being served by vacancy Pastor George Rothe of Bismarck.

The new church was dedicated the first Sunday in Advent, November 29, 1959. Three services were held with Pastors Kettenacher, Donald Kolander and Martin Janke as guest speakers.

The new church is of contemporary design and is built entirely above ground. The exterior is faced with Hebron brick while the interior is made of light weight masonary blocks. The entire roof is made up of laminated beams and trusses. The back wall of the chancel is also of Hebron brick to typify the solidity of our Lutheran Heri-

tage. A large cedar cross is suspended from this wall above the altar. The remainder of the building consists of a large assembly room, kitchen, smaller meeting room, boiler rooms, lavatories and a large sacristy study. Many willing hands of nearly every congregation member helped build this house of worship.

Present Church council members are: President, Quincy Maw; Secretary, Harold Wallner; Treasurer, Walter Martin; Financial Secretary, Ed Gimble and Building Fund Treasurer, August Doerr. Church Trustees: Alton Kemmet, Clayton Maw, and Clarence Hasse. St. John's is proud of their first son of the church to enter the Holy Ministry, Alvin Werre. Pastor Werre received his education in the church schools at Watertown and the seminary at East Mequon, Wisconsin. Pastor Werre was ordained and commissioned as a missionary in

his home church July 20, 1958. He served in Nigeria and Northern Rhodesia. Africa and at present serves the Lord at Altura, Minnesota.

The St. John's Ladies Aid was organized July 21, 1932 with Mrs. Eugene Hinderer as hostess. The object of this society was to foster Christian fellowship among its members, to perform works of charity, to provide for embellishment of the church and to raise money for Home and Foreign Missions and the benefit of our own congregation. "We give thanks to God and the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, praying always for you, since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus, and of the love which ye have to all the saints."

Thus did the Apostle Paul express himself as he wrote to the Christian Church at Colossae. The same would express the feeling of immigrant groups who knew the Lord upon their arrival in this country, upon hearing of others who had come to know the Lord in the new birth experience. One of their first desires then was to have fellowship together in the Name of Christ. Thus in 1907 three families to the south of Tappen began to meet together on the Lords day

was installed in the church basement. The basement walls were paneled in 1984. Steel siding was put on the church while Father Heubsch was pastor.

In 1983 Father Heubsch was transferred and Father Gerald McCarthy was the pastor until 1991 when Father Thomas Krupich came.

Lawn sprinklers were added to the lawn between the house and church in 1992. Upon completion of the lawn project, a permanent flower bed was made in front of the grotto.

Because of the high water table which started in 1993, drain tile was installed in the house basement in 2000, along with lifting and supporting the walls. After the completion of the basement, the upstairs of the house was redone. The outside of the parish house was painted and new shingles were put on.

In the summer of 2002, the Tappen parish became a mission of St. Francis de Sales Church in Steele with the transfer of the priest's residence to Steele.

After eleven years, Father Krupich was transferred to Grand Forks and Father Jerome Hunkler became pastor of the three parishes.

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

In 1969 a mortgage burning service was held and a new Rogers organ was dedicated. During the time, Russel Kloehn was the Pastor. In 1971 the old parsonage was sold to David Hagel, which is now the Doug Kramlich farmstead. The new parsonage was built and dedicated on November 28.

In 1974 the church celebrated its 50th anniversary. In 1994, Fay and John Hoffer estate bequeathed a substantial amount of money and extensive remodeling was done inside and out during the time Steve Steiner served our congregation. In 1992 a new Allen organ was dedicated with Professor Birsching acting as organist and recitalist.


We are proud of the two sons of our congregation.

BIBLE CLASS has about 12 in attendance who pursue the study of Scripture over coffee under the guidance of our Pastor.

SUNDAY SCHOOL numbers 47 children. Our Superintendent/Treasurer is Alton Stroh. Our coordinator of materials is Kris Stroh. Teachers are: Brett Stroh, Linda Rudolph, Beth Leier, Kris Stroh, Christopher Nicholson, Derek Leier, and Amanda Maw as helper. Our Confirmation Class gives special instructions to our 7th and 8th graders for two years taught by our Pastor. Helper is Bonney Stroh.

CHURCH ORGANISTS are Marlene Kemmet, Beth Leier, Ashley Olson, Shirley Berg, and Betty Russow. Our children who can play piano are encouraged to play for special parts of the service in hopes that they one day will become a church organist.

YOUTH GROUP is headed by our Pastor and Cindy Hasse. Other mothers also help with this organization which meets regularly with the goal of providing teens Bible Study, community service, and Christian fellowship with planned activities.

LADIES AIDE meets on the first Wednesday of each month at 8 pm. Bible Class led by our pastor is always part of the meeting along with a business meeting and lunch. Ladies take turns serving as officers of this organization.


